

CERTIFIED RECORD OF LAND CORNER MONUMENTATION

History of original corner establishment

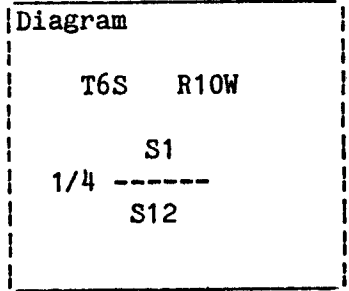
In 1890, Albert P. Wilson subdivided a portion of the township, and at this corner point, he set a post, from which:

- 5" Hemlock bears S13°E, 28 links.
- 7" Hemlock bears N53°W, 42 links.

In 1953, Mervin Whitmore, U.S. Forest Service, found the original BT's to this corner:

- 6" fallen Hemlock bears S13°E, 28 links.
- 14" Hemlock bears N55°W, 42 links.

He states that the corner post is gone.



Note: There is no record of Whitmore's recovery in the County Surveyor's Office.

Description of corner evidence found

At the corner point, I found the original NW bearing tree, a 14" Hemlock stub, 4-1/2 feet high, bears N53°W, 27.7 feet, w/ faint scribe marks "BT" visible on an opened face. No evidence of the original SE bearing tree remains. Also found a 40" Fir stump bears N21°E, 6.2 feet, w/ "1/4" cut into the face of the stump with a power saw (origin unknown).

Description of monument and accessories I established to perpetuate the original location of this corner

At record bearing and distance from the original NW bearing tree, I set a 30" long x 2-1/2" diameter aluminum pipe, with a 3-1/4" diameter aluminum cap marked as shown:

I mark the following new references:

- 6" Hemlock bears S59°W, 13.2 feet, scribed "1/4 S12 BT" on a double blaze.
- 5" Hemlock bears N27-1/2°W, 5.5 feet, scribed "X BT" on a double blaze.

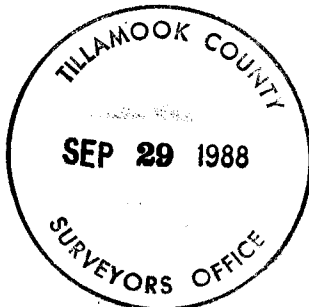
Note: I attach a brass washer stamped "RLS 1959" to the lower blaze of the new Hemlock BT's.
