- A spruce, 25 ins. diem., bears N. 89° E., 29 lks. dist., mkd. 2 87 BT RE2311 on partially healed blaze.
- A spruce, 21 ins. diam., bears N. 51 % W., 55 lks. dist., mkd. 2 87 BT on partially healed blaze.

Add marks BLM 1958 to broaze cap.

A basalt stone, not of record, 18 x 14 x 7 ins., is loosely set 4 ins. in the ground, alongside the iron post, with  $\frac{1}{2}$  chiseled on W. face.

N. 1° 58' E., beginning new measurement.
