scribes S34 visible.

12" Fir bears S50 1/2 E 15 lks.; missing.

50" Fir bears S60 W 8 lks.; now a 63" stump on west edge of cat road and covered with dirt.

- 42" Fir stub bears S09 1/2°E 101.0 ft. from corner point; now
- a 42" rotted stub with scribes T3S R7W S3 BT visible.

4"x4"x60" white painted Cedar post $883^{\circ}E$ 8.6 ft. from corner pipe. Metal location poster on new BTs. Also brass washers marked "LS1998" on new BTs. Also poster on 14" Fir BT $S84^{\circ}W$ 10.4 ft.
